2021 marked the 50th anniversary of Féile na nGael, the national underage festival of hurling, camogie and handball. The first Féile competition was hosted by Tipperary who invited u14 hurling teams from each county to participate in a festival of hurling on the weekend of 16th to 18th July 1971.

The inaugural Féile competition was organised in four divisions with the parade on Sunday evening after the Division 1 final. Blackrock from COrk won the Division 1 title while Comeda (Antrim), Dungiven (Derrry) and Portroe (Tipperary) won the Division 2, 3 and 4 respectively. Féile na nGael was an instant success and has become a part of the national games calendar over the last 50 years.

In 1982 Féile Peil na nÓg was established and was first held in Cavan. The 1982 Féile Peil na nÓg was run over two divisions with 20 visiting teams. In the Division 1 final Erin's Own defeated Salthill (Galway) while Clonmel Commercials (Tipperary) defeated Rathnew.

In 1971, Carnew Emmets were the Wicklow representatives at Féile. At that time Paddy O' Sullivan and Jim Darcy were training the team. and it was normal practice to load the lads into the back of the two cars and head off to play games around the county. The trip to Tipp was no different. The team piled into the two cars and headed for Templederry. 2020 Scór Sinsir All-Ireland Finals

The 2020 Scór Sinsir Competition reached its conclusion on Saturday evening the 20th of November 2021 in the salubrious environs of the Air Dome, Connacht GAA's Centre of Excellence in Cloonacurry, County Mayo.

For the first time in a number of years, Wicklow GAA had a participant in the finals. Blessington GAA's Sheila Naughton was crowned Leinster Champion in October which meant she would fly the club, county and provincial flag in the finals of the Aithriseoireacht/Recitation competition. In Saturday's final, Sheila faced tough competition from the other provinces, particularly from Munster, whose champion, Tipperary's Nollaig Seoige, was looking for a 4th All-Ireland title.

Sheila was first to tread the boards, and gave a great recitation of her piece, 'Our News'; displaying a great stage presence and an impeccable sense of timing. 'Our News' is a humorous take on the age-old classroom staple of infant classes writing about their 'news'.

Sheila received a rapturous applause from the large crowd gathered in the Dome, and when all four competitors had performed, the consensus was that she was right in the mix to be announced as the winner.

The long wait for Sheila then commenced as the winners would be announced when all of the other comórtais were completed, among them the Nuachleas/Novelty Act, a competition which Carnew Emmets won in 2000 and 2003, the last lime a Wicklow GAA act annexed All-Ireland honours. At around 8:15pm, to a hushed audience, Bean an Tí Aileen Ní Chinnéide, opened her envelope and announced the winner of the comórtas Aithriseoireachta. Unfortunately, from a Wicklow and Leinster perspective, it was from the Munster and Tipperary contingent that the whoops and hollers of victory came. JK Bracken's Nollaig Seoige had won his fourth title, a victory which makes him the most decorated competitor in the 52-year history of the competition. For Sheila, there was, of course, some disappointment. Pride, however, was the overriding emotion. "Hearing 'Wicklow' being called out on stage at an All-Ireland was a proud moment for me, and, I hope, Blessington." She's also hopeful that her success will go on to inspire other people to get



involved in Scór in the future. *"I love Scór and there's so much talent in the county. I hope this will truly put Scór on the map and see it grow to the level it's at in other counties."*

Critical Incident Planning

Critical Incident Planning is the process of planning and documenting the steps that your club will take if a critical incident were to occur in your club or community (a critical incident is defined as a situation that overwhelms one's natural capacity to respond).

There is no club who has not at some time swung into action to assist their members or the wider community when a critical incident has occurred. The devastation and trauma that can result from a sudden unexpected bereavement or injury can have a huge effect on your club and parish. Having a club Critical Incident Plan in place can help you and your members to plan and prepare for such incidents. How you cope, where you can go for help or advice, who will take charge are all worth thinking about. Even items as mundane as providing refreshments or organising car parking for a funeral or wake have to be planned.

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Jim Hamilton, Avondale

It was a cold December day in 2020 when we laid to rest Jim Hamilton in Barndarrig Cemetery. It was with deep regret we learned of his death and the news was received with widespread sorrow by all who knew him. Jim Hamilton had a lifelong interest in all G.A.A activities but his greatest loyalties lay with his Club. As a player he had a long and illustrious career and wore the green and white jersey of Avondale with pride and dignity. Jim loved the game of hurling. He learned his love of the game in the fields of Avondale where he played along with his brothers Jack and Mike and many of his neighbours. He developed his own skill and craft over the years. In the final of 1960 played in March 1961 Avondale defeated Kilcoole, he played in the half backs in that game with his brothers Jack in goals and Mick in the corner. He later moved into the corner back position where he excelled in the final of '64. On that occasion his brother Jack manned the goals. Avondale were back in the final of '66 when Carnew Emmet's now a rising force in hurling was the opposition. Jack moved out to his old position of half back and again proved his worth in a game that was won by the narrowest of margins 1-6 to 1-7. Due to the Covid19 virus and current restrictions only a small number were able to attend his funeral. However the Avondale club formed a guard of honour within the guidelines of social distance and former club chairman Victor O' Shaughnessy gave a grave side oration. Jim was a dedicated family man and to his wife Mary, sons James and Pat along with his extended family members and friends we extend our sincere sympathy.

Colm Maher, Annacurra/ Aughrim

It was with deep regret that we learned of the sudden death of Colm Maher. The large and representative gathering complying with social distance for the removal of his remains and subsequent burial in Killaveney cemetery bore ample testimony to the popularity and esteem in which Colm and his family are held. Colm, though gone to his eternal reward, will live vividly in the minds and hearts of his legion of friends with whom he shared the joys of living. He served both Annacurra and Aughrim clubs loyally for many years, from juvenile up to senior, was an outstanding sportsman and holder of three county championship medals. Along with his late brother Sean he was on the Annacurra team that defeated Barndarrig 0-15 to 1-11 after a replay and extra time to bring the championship to the "Derry Village". On that occasion he scored four vital points at crucial times in the game. In 2010 he was again part of the clubs Intermediate team's success. He was a member of the Aughrim Hurling clubs winning side of 2019 when they captured the junior "B" hurling championship defeating Arklow Rock Parnell's in the final. Colm also wore the Blue and Gold of the county when he played with the minor hurlers. Colm's passing has left a void in the lives of his many friends none more so than his devoted family. To his partner Tanya, children Cillian, Caoimhe and Shauna and to his family members and friends we offer our sincere sympathy.

Sean Crowley, Arklow Geraldines Ballymoney

With the death of Sean Crowley in January Arklow lost one of its most committed community campaigners. Sean was a native of Fermoy Co. Cork. Having worked in his native Fermoy, Thurles Rosslare Harbour and Bray he came to Arklow in the late fifties to work as chief clerk with Irish Rail at Arklow Railway Station. On the retirement of the then station master Mr Grogan, Sean was appointed station master. In his position as station master he was diligent in his duties and most obliging to the many people travelling from Arklow station. When he first came to Arklow he joined the Arklow Geraldines club. Here he made a huge contribution to its progress and development. After playing with the Geraldines for a short while he joined the club committee. At the clubs annual meeting in 1962 he was elected treasurer. It was a position he would hold for the next six years. During this time the club witnessed many changes not least the sale of Pearses Park on the Wexford Road and the purchase of the Greyhound Stadium on the Vale Road now Pearses Park. Sean played a major role in those transactions and during those years was a hardworking treasurer for the club. He also participated in the Scor and was a member of the Arklow Geraldine's question time team that won county honours for four years running, particularly in the centenary year of the Association where along with fellow members Willie Heaney and Mary Byrne they reached the All-Ireland final to be beaten by two points. A pioneer all his life he captained the Arklow Pioneer quiz team that won the Leinster championship. His contribution to the community life of Arklow was outstanding. He was a founder member of the Arklow Credit Union and served as its first Treasure/Manager for almost

25 years He was instrumental in reviving the local Pitch and Putt Club that was enjoyed by many locals and tourist alike. He was a member of the Central Council of the Pitch and Putt Union of Ireland. An astute Bridge player he played each week in the local Bridge Club. He served as tournament director in both the Apollo and "68" Bridge Clubs. Sean was also involved in local politics and in the 70's was a candidate in the local elections. His involvement in the Arklow Boxing Club and later at Provincial and National level is legendary. His commitment to the progress and development of the local club was exceptional. He was a former vice chairman and chairman of the club. He later progressed to become the Leinster secretary of the Leinster Council of the I.A.B.A. before moving to the national stage where for many years he was the voice of Irish Boxing. He held the position of general secretary of the I.A.B.A. for over 20 years and acted as MC and timekeeper at the national stadium. A proud Cork man his contribution to his adopted town was special and will long be remembered by a grateful community. Due to Covid19 restrictions his funeral mass was private. The cortege on its way to St. Gabriel's' cemetery passed by the Arklow Boxing Club where their flag flew at half-mast and members lined the footpath along with a guard of honour to pay their final respects to a man who contributed so much to the club, the sport and the local community. To His daughters Geraldines, Irene and Son Alister along with extended family members we extend our deepest sympathy.

Fr. Dermot Kavanagh, Rathnew

Over the years the contribution of the clergy to the G.A.A has been invaluable and on a cold day in January the Gaels of Rathnew laid to rest in Rathnew Cemetery the mortal remains of great Gael and an excellent priest, a tremendous follower and supporter of the "Game of the Gael", in particular of his club Rathnew of which he was a former player and current President. Fr Dermot Kavanagh was born in Rathnew on 17th October 1930 to Elizabeth and Thomas Kavanagh. He had five sister and six brothers. He was born into a family that treasured Irish culture and values, in a village where the youth of the locality spent most of their spare time playing hurling and football. It was into that environment that Fr Dermot was born and his love of football and hurling was nurtured in the local playing field in the company of his brothers, sisters and neighbours. He attended the local national school and played underage football and hurling with the local club. Here he garnered his love of Gaelic games, of Irish culture and his loyalty to the "Village". It was to hold him in good stead in the many years that was to follow. He was also a prolific Irish dancer and won many medals attending Na Feiseanna throughout the county-something he would later teach when in the USA. When he entered the congregation he went to

Rockwell College and later to the novitiate in Kilshane and was professed in 1954. He was ordained in 1960. His first appointment was to Nigeria. He was in Nigeria during the civil war and was credited with saving many of the churches records and artefacts. In 1971 he was appointed as pastor to St Joseph's Parish, New York. He would go on to work in Dakota and Texas before being pastor of St. Dunstan's Millbrae in California. During all those years abroad he never forgot his roots or his family ties to the local Rathnew club. His father wore the green and red jersey, his brothers and sisters also represented both club and county. His brother John captained the Rathnew team to win their last senior hurling championship in 1948. His sister May, Aggie and Kathleen were outstanding camogie players, May was inducted in to the camogie Hall of Fame as one of the best camogie players of all time. When her husband Joe "Dane "Byrne who was a member of the Rathnew team that won three in a row ('1941,'42'43) died in 1996, Fr Dermot came from the U.S.A to officiate at the funeral and mass. When Fr. Dermot retired he came back home to the "Village", the place where it all began, where he loved and where his heart was. He attended all the Rathnew games and would be seen regularly up in the pitch attending the training sessions. When he died the local community were limited in their expressions of sympathy due to Covid19, However the Gaels of Rathnew led by the Club Chairman Bobbie Dignam formed a guard of honour and marched alongside the cortege from the church to the graveyard where club man Pat Mitchell gave an oration. To his family and friends we extend our sincere sympathy.

Harry "Har" Donnelly, Offaly / Arklow Geraldines Ballymoney

It was with dep sorrow we learnt of the death of Har Donnelly. While Har had been unwell for some time never the less his demise was received with great regret. Har was a free kick specialist and captured the imagination of a generation with his place kicking. In 1961 he played in the "Pantheon of the Greats" when Offaly met Down in the All-Ireland football final. Har Donnelly was born in Kilcormac Co. Offaly where he grew up until he was seven when the family moved to Athlone. Har represented Westmeath at U14 level and won All Ireland Vocational School honours with his adopted county. He joined the Air Corps and it was their he made his mark as a footballer of excellence. Playing with the Air Corps he won two Dublin County senior league medals and contested two Dublin county championship finals 1960 and '61 against the great St Vincent's team. He was noticed by the Offaly selectors who selected him on the team to play in the Leinster championship of 1960. Offaly won the provincial title that year. Har's contribution played no small part on the road to victory. Offaly retained the

provincial crown the following year and again Har's contribution to that success was crucial. He was the top scorer for Offaly in the Leinster championship. The team moved on to reach the All-Ireland final of 1961 where the up and coming Down team was the opposition. It was a thrilling game from start to finish and eventful in many ways. The crowd was the biggest ever to attend an All-Ireland final over 90,000. On that faithful day Offaly came up short by one point 2-8 to 3-6. On the day Har was the top scorer with six points. In 1960 and '61 Har was the top scorer in Ireland. In 1961 he scored 5-90. Coming to work in Arklow he worked in NET and trained teams both Arklow Geraldines and Ballymoney clubs. Har also trained Ballymanus to reach the Intermediate final of 1984. Harry made many friends, his sincerity, his earnestness, his melodious voice and his rich sense of humour endeared him to many. Har loved to tell stories of games past. He was a great raconteur. However, for all his love of the GAA, he was first and foremost a family man and his passing is a great loss to his wife Sheila sons, Ronald, Colm and daughter Karen their family's his sisters and brother and a wide circle of relatives and friends. Paddy McCrudden, Arklow Geraldines Ballymoney

In mid-February the death took place after a long and debilitating illness borne with great bravery and fortitude of Paddy McCrudden. His death brought back many memories to the older generations as regards his exploits on the Gaelic fields of Wicklow and beyond- exploits that caused him to be regarded as one of the most outstanding young players of his time. He played hurling and football at under age and adult level for the club. As a fledgling player he played in the local street leagues. It was not long until he was playing on the club teams. In 1952 he was on the Geraldines under 14 team that defeated St Patricks Wicklow to win the county championship. On returning to Arklow the team paraded to his home with the cup to give three cheers and acknowledge the part he played as captain of the team. He was back playing with the club the following year. In 1958 the club reached the county minor semi-final when they were defeated by St. Patricks Wicklow. In this game he was joined by his brother Brendan who would also go on to wear

the Blue and Gold of the county. In 1958 Paddy had moved on to the senior team and was a member of the side that was defeated in the memorable championship game against Forestry College. He was on the senior panel in 1959 when Geraldines defeated county champions Baltinglass in the championship quarter final. He represented the county at minor level for three years. His first appearance was against Meath in the Leinster Semi-Final of 1955. The following year 1956 he played against Carlow. He was centre forward in 1957 when Laois defeated Wicklow in the Leinster championship. Paddy will long be remembered by his contemporaries who had the pleasure of playing with him and happy memories of this great sporting hero from St. Peters Place. To his wife Marie, sons John, Alison, Niall and daughter Aisling, brother Brendan and sister Mary along with extended family and friends we offer our sincere sympathy.

Sean ran a successful grocery business in the town was married to Bríd a school teacher who hailed from the West of Ireland. It is sad to state Brid passed away just hours after Sean. Ahead of the funeral service both the hearses were brought to Weavers Square where they had the grocery shop for up to 50 years. The streets were lined with members of the local club along with members of the local community all paying their respects to a couple that had served the community in so many ways for so many years. Eamonn "Fitch" Moules, Annacurra

The death of Eamonn "Fitch" Moules in November marked a major passing in the history of the G.A.A. not only in the parish of Annacurra but throughout the county and beyond. "Fitch" as he was known to all had a lifelong association with the G.A.A as a player , administrator and as a referee where he gained national prominence. "Fitch "was born into a tradition in which land religion and culture were important. It was a culture that Eamonn "Fitch" Moules embraced both on and off the field. As a young boy growing up in Annacurra he was to witnessed great deeds by the men wearing the Green and Gold. He was only seven years old when Mick Carthy led the Annacurra team to victory in the senior championship of 1931 played in '32. It was to leave an enduring impression on the young "Fitch" Moules. In 1942 he tasted success when he was a member of the Hacketstown minor team that won the Wicklow Championship. Four years later he won a county junior hurling medal playing with Kilmacoo. In 1950 He was playing in the half forwards when Annacurra had to give best to Kilcoole in the Intermediate final. Three years later he was corner forward when Annacurra defeated Baltinglass to win the Intermediate championship. In 1955 he was corner back when Annacurra were defeated in the senior final by St Patrick's Wicklow. When he retired he immersed himself into administration and was secretary of the South District Board for over a decade. He was also the County Groundsman in Aughrim. He commenced refereeing in the South District but it was not long before his services were south after the length and breath of the county. Within the county he was to officiate at finals in every grade and in both codes. He was in charge of 12 senior football finals and one senior hurling final. At intercounty level is first game was the Leinster minor hurling final replay of 1955. He later went on to take charge of provincial finals in both Leinster and Connaught. He was the man in the middle for the All-Ireland senior football finals of 1962 and '63. He also was appointed to referee two National League finals one in the Gaelic Grounds New York. In the presence of a large crowd when his remains were brought to St. Bridget's Church the Annacurra Club formed a guard of honour where the Annacurra flag was draped on the coffin. The Club forward a guard of honour as his remains were brought to the graveside where former chairman of the County Board Jimmy Dunne delivered a fitting oration. Eamonn "Fitch" Moules will be remembered for his contribution to the Association and in particular the pride and joy he gave to his Club and all Wicklow Gaels during his time as a top referee. In this final Kilmacanogue were not going to be denied victory, George playing corner back along with his brothers Christy and Paddy playing outfield brought home Kilmacanogue third championship title and their first since 1966. George had unwavering loyalty to his club. Reflections of his many fine performances will stay in the mind, accompanied by the many found memories of a true sportsman both on and off the playing field.
